dying well

Setting

Dying well begins with living well. Living well is living with the confidence that I belong to God.

Philippians 1:6 For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus.

Ephesians 3:11-12 This was in accordance with the eternal purpose which He carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, ¹² in whom we have boldness and confident access through faith in Him.

II Corinthians 5:6-9 Therefore, being always of good courage, and knowing that while we are at home in the body we are absent from the Lord—⁷ for we walk by faith, not by sight—⁸ we are of good courage, I say, and prefer rather to be absent from the body and to be at home with the Lord.⁹ Therefore we also have as our ambition, whether at home or absent, to be pleasing to Him.

I John 5:13-16 These things I have written to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life. ¹⁴ This is the confidence which we have before Him, that, if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. ¹⁵ And if we know that He hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have the requests which we have asked from Him.

How to Talk to a Dying Person

Phase 1 – The initial revelation –

- Tell me what you are thinking.
 - Listen for emotions reflect it, get in it with them.
 - "Oh that hurts!" Weep with those who weep. Job 16:20, Rom. 12:15-16
- Tell me more I am here.

Phase 2 - Fight or not to fight

- It is their choice, there is no right or wrong.
- Ask, "What should I pray for next?"
- When they doubt

Tell them that it is normal. Suggest - "let's pray for confidence"

Read Is. 40:27-31

Three ways God helps us.

Miracles

Power

Endurance

Phase 3 – Death is coming, they know.

Ask "How can I pray?"

"What needs to happen should you die soon?"

"How can I help?"

"May I share some of my favorite thoughts about heaven with you?"

Read Spurgeon to them "We Shall See God"

"Are you ready to meet with the Lord?"

"Is there anything you need to set right with anyone?"

"Tell me your story and when God entered the picture."

Read Ps. 90:17
