
Jonah 1 (Part 2) and 2

Review from last week:

- Great book to read in a spiritual dry season
 - When dry, let Scripture remind us of what God is like.
 - · His attributes, character, heart, strength, actions, initiating, love
- Each chapter reveals the same 2 themes:
 - 1. God's Heart
 - Love for the lost
 - How He initiates, intervenes, never gives up on Jonah/Ninevites
 - 2. Jonah's Heart (ours)
 - God's call immediately revealed Jonah's twisted heart
 - Our bent toward: running, hiding, rebelling, sinning
- Jonah was a powerful prophet in bad & good times for Israel
 - Israel (northern kingdom) was losing territory from surrounding pagan nations
 - Abysmal & evil leadership (Jeroboam II)
 - o God rescued Israel; spoke thru Jonah who prophesied a turnaround
 - o Israel prospered economically & politically, but was sinking spiritually
 - Jonah was fiercely nationalistic for Israel
- Assyrian Empire dominated known world & was coming for Israel
 - Most blood-thirsty and cruel military oppressor in human history
 - Arch-enemy of Israel
 - All current prophets (Amos, Hosea, Jonah) already knew:
 - Assyria would conquer Israel (40 yrs later)
 - God would judge/destroy Nineveh (150 yrs later)
- God called Jonah to preach to city of Nineveh (Assyrian capital)
 - Jonah refused and fled the "Presence of the Lord"
 - o God's call made no sense theologically or politically
 - Boarded a ship to head to Tarshish (furthest possible point west)

Jonah Flees the Presence of the LORD

1 Now the word of the LORD came to Jonah the son of Amittai, saying, ² "Arise, go to Nineveh, that great city, and call out against it, for their evil has come up before me." ³ But Jonah rose to flee to Tarshish from the presence of the LORD. He went down to Joppa and found a ship going to Tarshish. So he paid the fare and went down into it, to go with them to Tarshish, away from the presence of the LORD.



Jonah's possible reasons for fleeing God's call

- 1. Race, Nationalism & superiority of Israel (Jonah's real heart's desire)
- 2. Hated God's plan. Reveled in his comfortable ministry & worldview
- 3. Hated God's heart for the lost (outside Israel)
- 4. Did not see God's grace to himself or Israel
- 5. Minimized his own sin. Imagined it would bring better results. No grief.
- 6. Ran from a real relationship with God. Religious, but wouldn't be challenged by God

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⁴ But the LORD hurled a great wind upon the sea, and there was a mighty tempest on the sea, so that the ship threatened to break up. ⁵ Then the mariners were afraid, and each cried out to his god. And they hurled the cargo that was in the ship into the sea to lighten it for them. But Jonah had gone down into the inner part of the ship and had lain down and was fast asleep. ⁶ So the captain came and said to him, "What do you mean, you sleeper? Arise, call out to your god! Perhaps the god will give a thought to us, that we may not perish."

^{*} Notably absent: fear

Jonah Is Thrown into the Sea

⁷ And they said to one another, "Come, let us cast lots, that we may know on whose account this evil has come upon us." So they cast lots, and the lot fell on Jonah. ⁸ Then they said to him, "Tell us on whose account this evil has come upon us. What is your occupation? And where do you come from? What is your country? And of what people are you?" ⁹ And he said to them, "I am a Hebrew, and I fear the LORD, the God of heaven, who made the sea and the dry land." ¹⁰ Then the men were exceedingly afraid and said to him, "What is this that you have done!" For the men knew that he was fleeing from the presence of the LORD, because he had told them.

¹¹ Then they said to him, "What shall we do to you, that the sea may quiet down for us?" For the sea grew more and more tempestuous. ¹² He said to them, "Pick me up and hurl me into the sea; then the sea will quiet down for you, for I know it is because of me that this great tempest has come upon you." ¹³ Nevertheless, the men rowed hard to get back to dry land, but they could not, for the sea grew more and more tempestuous against them. ¹⁴ Therefore they called out to the LORD, "O LORD, let us not perish for this man's life, and lay not on us innocent blood, for you, O LORD, have done as it pleased you." ¹⁵ So they picked up Jonah and hurled him into the sea, and the sea ceased from its raging. ¹⁶ Then the men feared the LORD exceedingly, and they offered a sacrifice to the LORD and made yows.

A Great Fish Swallows Jonah

¹⁷ And the LORD appointed a great fish to swallow up Jonah. And Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights.




Results?

The Sign of Jonah (Matt 12)

³⁸ Then some of the scribes and Pharisees answered him, saying, "Teacher, we wish to see a sign from you." ³⁹ But he answered them, "An evil and adulterous generation seeks for a sign, but no sign will be given to it except the sign of the prophet Jonah. ⁴⁰ For just as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish, so will the Son of Man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth. ⁴¹ The men of Nineveh will rise up at the judgment with this generation and condemn it, for they repented at the preaching of Jonah, and behold, something greater than Jonah is here.

REPENT AND BELIEVE	
 Resisted repentance, then believed. Baptized by a watery judgment that washed him with God's cleansing mercy. Ninevites (sinners) responded by repenting & believing 	 Had no personal sin from which to repent, yet took on our sin. Identified with our sins in His baptism. Both warns/promises that salvation is possible for anyone who repents & believes in Him (including Ninevites, Scribes & Pharisees)

HOW was Jonah transformed/renewed by God?

3 Big things:

- 1. AWAKENING (owning his true condition)
- 2. **BELIEVING** (faith in God & his future sparked)
- 3. REPENTING

Jonah's Prayer

2 Then Jonah prayed to the LORD his God from the belly of the fish, ² saying,

"I called out to the LORD, out of my

distress,
and he answered me;
out of the belly of Sheol I cried,
and you heard my voice.

³ For you cast me into the deep,
into the heart of the seas,
and the flood surrounded me;
all your waves and your billows
passed over me.

⁴ Then I said, 'I am driven away

from your sight;
yet I shall again look
upon your holy temple.'

⁵ The waters closed in over me to take my

life:

the deep surrounded me; weeds were wrapped about my head at the roots of the mountains. I went down to the land whose bars closed upon me forever; yet you brought up my life from the pit, O LORD my God. ⁷ When my life was fainting away. I remembered the LORD. and my prayer came to you, into your holy temple. ⁸ Those who pay regard to vain idols forsake their hope of steadfast love. 9 But I with the voice of thanksgiving will sacrifice to you: what I have vowed I will pay. Salvation belongs to the LORD!"

¹⁰ And the LORD spoke to the fish, and it vomited Jonah out upon the dry land.
